LITTLE LESSON FOR LITTLE HEARTS

Sometimes God lets the comfortable cushion slide right out from under us. Our careful plans get sifted through His great, kind hands, and the road gets foggy — we "can hardly see what's in front." That can feel scary, but this song teaches us where peace really comes from. It is not from having everything figured out; it is from Who is holding us. "It's still Daddy who's in control" — "we know that all things work together for good to them that love God" (Romans 8:28), and we can cast "all your care upon him; for he careth for you" (1 Peter 5:7). God promises a peace that does not depend on the fog lifting: "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee" (Isaiah 26:3), and a peace "which passeth all understanding" that guards our hearts (Philippians 4:7). And here is the tender part for every child who has ever thought "I should be further along by now": when we think we're good — or when we feel like a mess — He gently reminds us, "You're not finished with me yet." "He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6). He is the One who started it, and He is the One who will finish it, because "it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of his good pleasure" (Philippians 2:13). So when the wheels come off, we don't have to panic — His peace washes over us, and His great big hands never let go.
